		score the projects before the February Committee where all scores would be shared; these scores would then be compared with the Forum's outputs at the March Committee where a recommendation would be formulated for Full Council. Cllr Paine registered his concern that the draft Transport Policy and Strategy does not mention the requirement to secure land that may be required to build a link road in the future. It was AGREED that the Officer would seek advice from SHDC Monitoring Officer about whether a recommendation on this policy from the March Town Matters Committee could be taken to Full Council in April (which will fall in the local election purdah period), given the local sensitivity and notantial investment elements of the policy







SW Marine Plans - Iteration 3

You have been sent this email as a member of either a local South Devon AONB Estuary Forum or Management Group, or the South Devon Catchments Partnership, due to you interest in aquatic management matters – and my apologies if you receive this message more than once.

As most of you will be aware, the Marine Management Organisation are presently preparing the Inshore and Offshore Marine Plans for the South West and are within their 3rd iteration of the process - 'Policy Development' and are asking for our feedback and thoughts. The South West Marine Plans do cover a very large area but it is part* of our coast, so we all have a vested interest in the future of our coast, how it is managed, how it is used and how it is cared for!

This final iteration process asks for our feedback on the policies that will be packaged together for the public consultation of the Draft Plan late 2019/early 2020 ... we considered just 5 of the policies at the Dartington workshop event yesterday and ... let's just suggest that we had a lot to say! There are apparently 80 different policies – no-one is suggesting that we will read, muse and comment on each (but feel free!) but maybe pick out the policies that you have most interest or expertise in.

This $3^{\rm rd}$ process is all online and there is an attractive 'story map' that will help guide you through the process and give you more of the background -

https://defra.maps.arcgis.com/apps/MapJournal/index.html?appid=a0086a7106ff4100af3d087b0abca2 d9%20# - and usefully, apparently you can dip-in and dip-out at anytime without losing work you've already done. The closing date for comments etc. is the 29^{th} March, 2019.

*'Part' of our coast? South Devon falls on the border between the SW and South Marine Plans, with the formal line just west of the mouth of the Dart Estuary ... don't ask, we don't know either but it had to go somewhere ... For further information on the completed, adopted and active South Marine Plans (Dart estuary & east), do visit https://www.gov.uk/government/collections/south-marine-plans BUT, don't think of this border as a hard line and don't ignore the SW Marine Plans development.

The Marine Plans are high level and quite 'broad brush', so don't expect too much at the very local level – for that we have the South Devon AONB Estuaries Management Plan and the South Devon Catchments Plan, which we trust will be given due regard locally within the Marine Plans.
