Devon County Council: key issues

Important public highways consultation: last few days to respond (by Thursday 13th July):

Notification Issued on behalf of Councillor Andrea Davis, Peninsula Transport Chairman

Dear stakeholder,

You may already be aware that National Highways have published a number of key documents in relation to the next Road Investment Strategy (RIS) period (2025-2030). The documents relate to the future of the strategic road network (SRN), which encompasses motorways and major A-roads.

The Department for Transport will now undertake an 8-week public consultation process on the SRN Initial Report. This will inform DfT's draft Road Investment Strategy and National Highway's draft strategic business plan.

Peninsula transport has been engaged in the development process to date. We are now reviewing the documentation and will set out our full responses in due course but we encourage those living, working and travelling within the peninsula to also have their say. We have placed the links below for those interested in responding. We recommend you respond directly to the consultation, but please also send any comments to us that you would like the STB to consider, you can do this by emailing info@peninsulatransport.org.uk.

Highways Issues: (see also Highways Performance Dashboard at the end of this report)

Priority locations for highways works: I have been asked to invite proposals for the draft programme for next year's repairs. As your Devon County Cllr., I can submit proposals on your behalf this coming September, for the first draft repairs programme for 2024/25. If you are aware of any sites that are particularly important to Town / Parish Councils, or for which you are receiving lots of correspondence please submit them (ideally no more than 2 per parish). Due to restrained budgets and existing priorities there are no guarantees of being included in next year's programme, but I'm told that those that are important to the local communities will be given a degree of priority.

Highways disruption continues with Wildenet and Airband continuing their programmes. Many complaints have been sent in to DCC Highways team, but their role is to coordinate as best they can, although there is a real race to get all this work carried out as much as possible during the summer months and better weather. Wildenet do provide notification via Highways, but Airband are far less helpful. I've asked at DCC for this to be improved.

Highways works Coordination – disruption and issues with roadworks and fibre broadband installation. Along with many Parish Councils I have been receiving complaints from members of the public and others about the severe disruption with all these works taking place so close to each other at the same time. Further to the issue being raised at Harberton PC last month regarding the apparent poor coordination of directed diversion routes also being closed off, the Highways team did address this further to my request.

Unfortunately, the dry weather is better for carrying out all roadworks, so with maintenance very behind and many repairs outstanding, plus the installation by 2 separate companies of the fibre broadband services, we have difficult times, with roadworks ahead still to come. Devon's 20's Plenty Campaign: My motion to DCC to implement across the County has been tabled but is currently awaiting a return to Full Council for decision with a Cabinet recommendation. Meanwhile this is some information on the county wide campaign. There is a map (continuously expanding) of the parishes in Devon that have supported 20's Plenty and written to DCC requesting they change their default policy from 30mph to 20mph. Speed and other Highways surveys

In response to requests from some Parish Councillors and residents I requested Speed (SCARF) surveys on some roads where vehicles exceeding the legal limit for the road was perceived as happening. This is the note from the Highways team and the two sets of results that have been sent to date: The Highways team reported: "I am emailing as two of the sites have been surveyed and the data has been returned and validated. A summary of the data taken is below. The A385 Bridgetown Hill site has been delayed due to the current W&W work, but is in

New Speed camera at Keviccs: This has been installed as part of the Zero tolerance campaign on speeding across Devon. 
Road markings and parked vehicle at North end of Brutus Bridge. As previously reported, this vehicle (being used for advertising) remains in situ despite the (poor quality) road markings that have been recently painted in around it as part of the waiting restriction programme. I have reported this in and raised the matter again at last week's HATOC (Highways and Traffic Orders Committee) meeting where I was informed that DCC Highways cannot demand that a vehicle with tax and insurance be required to be moved! I've challenged this as it's an eyesore that many people have complained about over the years and it seems incredulous to me, that this is apparently permissible but prevents scheduled roadworks. (I've pointed out that Temporary Prohibition of Parking is currently being applied elsewhere to enable roadworks).

Monitoring wires in Totnes roads: I have been approached by a number of people asking about some traffic monitoring happening on Heaths Way and by Western Bypass. The interesting response from Highways was as follows:

"I am not aware of the surveys so have forwarded your enquiry to our Traffic & Highway Data Team. There are numerous reasons others may be undertaking these types of surveys so they may not originate from them or even DCC, if they are related to a development we often aren't told they are being installed. I have heard back from our Data Team in relation to the survey 'wires'. It is not something they are aware of or have organised. The reported "wires" are almost certainly pneumatic tubes which have been installed by a traffic survey company (MetroCount) at the request of someone else, usually a developer. Because these are privately paid for, we don't have the right to the results."

(Anecdotally I've been informed that this monitoring was being carried out on behalf of the developers at Baltic Wharf).

Proposed changes to location of zebra crossing at Harbertonford. DCC is currently consulting with the Parish Council, with a view to public consultation being the next step.



Highways Issues at The Plains, Totnes. This is National Grid works, an enforcement case has been raised at South hams District Council regarding concerns about this.

Blocked Gullies on Fore St., Totnes:

Further to complaints raised at Totnes TC, regarding four drains in a row in Fore St., that many people agreed had not been cleaned out and had been blocked for a number of years, this was reported in to the Highways Team as they cause a problem during heavy rain which just runs further down the street and becomes a river, threatening some of the lower shops. This has received a positive reply:

"I have logged requests for the 8 gullies on Fore Street, between Station Road and the arch. I have also raised two requests for the gullies on the linking footpath between Fore Street and Ticklemore Street."

Installation of Poles for Fibre Broadband provision in proximity to Listed heritage buildings – Week Hamlet.

Complaints have been raised regarding Airband's programme of installing 9 meter high poles in the heart of this hamlet within meters of some of the many listed building there. A copy of a recent appeal by Airband, that was dismissed by the Inspectors regarding similar proposals for installations that were refused by the LPA in Cookham, Berkshire were sent in with the concerns and complaints from residents and parish Councillors. The difficulty is the permitted development rights given to the installers that means they can over ride LPA's when it comes to telecommunications poles whereas masts can be refused. I am pressing for underground trunking to be required.

South Hams District Council – Key Issues

SHDC has offered Teams Virtual meetings with Town and Parish Councils:

<u>Tuesday 11th July 2023 10.30am – 12 Noon:</u> Meeting about developing Active Travel routes: Session to outline the purpose and process involved in a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) and look at the district wide data that informs it. This meeting will not go into detail on places as we will have these discussions with those who request them following on from this. The meeting will also be recorded and shared for anyone who is unable to join the time proposed.

<u>Wednesday 26th July 2023 at 6pm</u>. This week the South Hams District Council Executive discussed plans to develop a new corporate strategy

"The Council wishes to set ambitious and challenging policies to address the issues facing our communities, working towards a vision for South Hams as a place with the best environment for people and for nature and which is resilient in the face of an increasingly uncertain future. We know that we cannot do this alone and are therefore very keen to start conversations with Towns and Parishes. To start the conversation, we are proposing holding a Town and Parish Forum meeting online on Microsoft Teams"

It is hoped that a representative (or two) from each Council is able to attend the meeting and hear from Councillor Brazil (Leader of the Council) and fellow District Councillors about our ambitions as well as having an open discussion about how we can work together with you and our communities to achieve our collective ambitions. South Devon Freeport. Further to my tabling a motion to the new Council to review and reconsider their involvement with the South Devon Freeport, a meeting of the new Executive was held where this review was agreed by the Executive and a full-scale review has been scheduled including a full audit review. Further to this review it will come back to Full Council for SHDC to reconsider its position. I was then asked if I was willing to withdraw my motion, which I did on the basis that this review is comprehensive and thorough.

Full Council 28th June 2028. The following motion was approved by the Council:

- It recognises the urgent need for community energy generation projects and the need to create the legislative environment in which they can succeed.
- It fully supports clauses 272 and 273 of the Energy Bill and urges government to speed the passage of the Energy Bill or, in recognition of the importance of clauses 272 and 273, to allow the Local Electricity Bill to proceed separately and at speed.
- It will write to our local MPs and the leaders of all the UK political parties emphasising the importance of community energy projects and the urgent need to expedite changes to legislation to make them viable.
- It will seek to partner with other Local Authorities both directly and through the LGA to lobby parliament to achieve the legislative changes.

- It will publicise, through all suitable media channels, the importance of the need for changes to legislation to allow community energy projects to succeed.'
- It will write to the Heart of South West (HOSW) Local Enterprise Partnership and request that the installation of the vital Grid Network Link at Hinkley is brought forward as a matter of urgency to enable more renewable energy projects to come forward and not left awaiting the commissioning of Hinckley C nuclear power station, which could take years.

Sustainable South Hams was granted £40,000 to enable its programe of sustainable projects and activities that will support SHDC and its residents to reduce their carbon footprint, enrich understanding and behaviour towards wildlife and habitats and help SHDC reach its climate and biodiversity targets. https://www.sussh.org/about

A partnership forum is being established to include a number of SHDC Members and representatives of environmental groups and specialists to work together on achieving the climate and biodiversity actions and targets towards Net Zero.

Composting at SHDC. Much of the £200,000 set aside a couple of years ago to provide some match funding to Town and Parish Councils to support local community composting initiatives, currently remains unspent. It is my intention to put this opportunity to good use and encourage everyone who can and is willing to compost their biodegradable waste including garden waste, making wormeries etc and getting involved locally.

Community Composting: As the newly appointed Executive Member for this role, I have agreed to support and work with a new programme of public events and activities being developed by a small group from Sustainable South Hams, including 'Dr Compost' Nicky Scott. These initiatives have already started and I'll be able to promote and report further in September. DCC Members Visit to Holsworthy Anaerobic Digestion Plant. 20th June 2023

Despite some very fruity smells on arrival, this proved to be a very interesting visit. This will be a very useful reference for my new role as SHDC Executive Member with the portfolio for composting; a role I intend to use as widely as possible to press for far more local community and individual composting, and far less transporting of biodegradable materials across the county. This will not only help reduce our collective carbon footprint in South Hams, but also make good use of materials that people can turn into compost for their own gardens, patio pots and window boxes, and providing a choice from paying for garden waste collection.

This photo shows the food waste lorry emptying its load on arrival where all the plastic and biodegradable bags are removed prior to processing the food waste. THE MESSAGE FROM THE SITE OPERATORS WAS THAT IT IS MUCH BETTER FOR THEM AND THEIR MACHINES IF PEOPLE DON'T USE ANY BAGS IN THEIR FOOD WASTE BINS, just a couple of sheets of newspaper is much better and can then be easily composted. (ALL bags are treated the same at the plant, so a waste of money too if you are paying extra for compostable etc bags).


