The Totnes Community Composting Group (TCCG) is an offshoot from Sustainable South Hams (SusSH), a Community Interest Company whose profits go back in to supporting and inspiring sustainability projects in the Devon South Hams.

Councillor Jacqi Hodgson is one of the founders of the Company and creator of TCCG.

What is community composting?



Community composting involves residents bringing garden cuttings to a local drop off site.

Residents may also **take home the resulting compost** to use in their own gardens.

The benefits are:

- Builds local soil health
- Reduces transportation emissions
- Protects Natural Resources

This is a model already proven in many nearby communities





Residents responded with overwhelming positive support for the idea



We've identified a great site for community composting at Follaton House



The site has been confirmed as worthy of consideration

An onsite meeting with SHDC estate officers (Guy Pedrick and Gavin Priest) and the TCCG including Cllr Hodgson, was held on Monday 24th March and the officers confirmed that this site is worthy of consideration for use as a community composting location.

Further discussions are needed to ensure we are considering and addressing the objections raised around the repurposing of the space as it is currently used as storage by the council.



It's situated at the west entrance of Follaton House and would give the best all round position

Three possible sites within Follaton were recently discussed, however TCCG believe Site A has the greatest potential as it is:

- on the edge of the property
- well screened from the rest of the site
- requires minimal work to make operational (ie. existing fencing, hard standing and inbuilt traffic flow management)


Alongside seeking a site to house the community composting service we also ran a survey. The results indicate strong support for drop off and usage of compost.


The reach of our survey within the community was extensive

Survey flyers were included in the April
Totnes Directory and reached 4,200 homes

Advertisements directing people to an online version of the survey that was advertised through local news channels, shop windows and at meeting places extended the audience reach further still.




Respondents showed overwhelming support for a community composting site

161 voted yes 1 voted no



Interest in volunteering at the site is also strong

Very strong interest in site volunteering was recorded, however a more accurate view of this will be gained once a site has been secured. Almost half of potential volunteers will be influenced by the location of the site.



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A handful of objections and queries were raised by respondents

These focused on site location, motivations of those involved and a desire to see more information presented about the project.

This is useful feedback that can be used to inform future communications.


However is it being done to line councillors pockets / or the organisers pockets as these schemes usually do

I have seen no explanation as to the advantages over the current brown bin and food waste collections - in the absence of this it sounds like greenwash

Concerned about location - needs a large area on the edge of town. Opposed to taking existing car parking spaces and locations where traffic queues may block roads.

A regular drop off frequency of garden materials was indicated


Whilst evidence from other composting sites indicates the quantity of material a resident needs to drop will vary across the seasons, the majority of respondents indicated a regular drop of cadence of weekly to monthly.





Residents will drop off a moderate amount of garden clippings each time


Most respondents will bring a few bing bags. A full car boot is the next most popular option. This moderate amount of material, should be easy to handle and likely mean a quick turn around during drop off.





'Yes please! We'd like to take home compost created at the site' they told us

The majority (88.9%) of respondents wish to take home compost created at the site indicating a strong demand for the product and an ability to keep the material moving through the system.
